








Taking G20 to the Last Mile Leaving None Behind



'Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam' - these two words capture a deep

The post-pandemic world order is very different from the world before it. There are three important changes, among others.

First, there is a growing realisation that a shift away from a GDP-centric view of the world to a human-centric view is needed.

Second, the world is recognizing the importance of resilience and reliability in global supply chains.

Third, there is a **collective call for boosting multilateralism** through the reform of global institutions.

Our G20 Presidency has played the role of a catalyst in these shifts.

In December 2022, when we took over the Presidency from Indonesia, I had written that a mindset shift must be catalysed by the G20. This was especially needed in the context of mainstreaming the marginalized aspirations of developing countries, the Global South and Africa.

The Voice of Global South Summit, which witnessed participation from 125 countries, was one of the foremost initiatives under our Presidency. It was an important exercise to gather inputs and ideas from the Global South. Further, our Presidency has not only seen the largest-ever participation from African countries but has also pushed for the inclusion of the African Union as a permanent member of the G20.









An interconnected world means our challenges across domains are interlinked. This is the midway year of the 2030 Agenda and many are noting with great concern that the progress on SDGs is off-track. The G20 2023 Action Plan to Accelerate Progress on SDGs will spearhead the future direction of the G20 towards implementing SDGs.

In India, living in harmony with nature has been a norm since ancient times and we have been contributing our share towards climate action even in modern times. Many countries of the Global South are at various stages of development and climate action must be a complementary pursuit. Ambitions for climate action must be matched with actions on climate finance and transfer of technology.

We believe there is a need to move away from a purely restrictive attitude of what should not be done, to a more constructive attitude focusing on what can be done to fight climate change.

The Chennai High-Level Principles (HLPs) for a Sustainable and Resilient Blue Economy focus on keeping our oceans healthy.

A global ecosystem for clean and green hydrogen will emerge from our presidency, along with a Green Hydrogen Innovation Centre.

In 2015, we launched the International Solar Alliance. Now, through the Global Biofuels Alliance, we will support the world to enable energy transitions in tune with the benefits of a circular economy.

Democratising climate action is the best way to impart momentum to the movement. **Just as individuals make daily decisions based on their long-term health**, they can make lifestyle decisions based on the impact on the planet's long-term health. Just like Yoga became

a global mass movement for wellness, we have also nudged the world with Lifestyles for Sustainable Development.

Due to the impact of climate change, ensuring food and nutritional security will be crucial. Millets, or Shree Anna, can help with this while also boosting climate-smart agriculture. In the International Year of Millets, we have taken millets to global palates. The Deccan HLPs on Food Security and Nutrition is also helpful in this direction.

Technology is transformative but it also needs to be made inclusive. In the past, the benefits of technological advancements have not

benefited all sections of society equally. India, over the last few years, has shown how technology can be leveraged to narrow inequalities, rather than widen them.

For instance, the billions across the world that remain unbanked, or lack digital identities, can be financially included through digital public infrastructure (DPI). The solutions we have built using our DPI have now been recognised globally. Now, through the G20, we will help developing countries adapt, build, and scale DPI to unlock the power of inclusive growth.

That India is the fastest-growing large economy is no accident. Our simple, scalable and sustainable solutions have empowered the vulnerable and the marginalised to lead our development story. From space to sports, economy to entrepreneurship, Indian women have taken the lead in various sectors. They have shifted the narrative from the development of women to women-led development. Our G20 Presidency is working on bridging the gender digital divide, reducing labour force participation gaps and enabling a larger role for women in leadership and decision-making.

We need to move from "I" to "We" for creation, innovation, and viable solutions.

"I" to "We".

that means thinking of the whole from the self,

the well-being of "us" instead of just "me,"

We have to emphasize on this.

We must connect every class, every country, every society, and every region of the world.

And this is the essence of the One Family concept.

Just like every family has its own support system, we need to build a global support system together.

We should develop the mindset that someone else's happiness should make us happy, and someone else's sorrow should make us equally sad.

When we think as One Family, we also keep in mind how to empower each member.

It is in this spirit that India wants to share its every experience with its huge global family.

In India, we have adopted technology as a bridge to make development inclusive and sustainable.

India has developed a new model of inclusion, transparency, and targeted interventions with the JAM Trinity of bank accounts, Aadhar identity and mobile phones.

The World Bank has also acknowledged that the JAM Trinity has achieved a financial inclusion rate in just 6 years which would have taken 47 years to achieve.

Using this model, India has transferred 360 billion dollars directly to the bank accounts of those in need over the past decade.

This has prevented leakage of approximately 33 billion dollars, which is nearly 1.25% of the GDP.

Certainly, this model can be very beneficial for the global family, especially for the Global South.

Friends,

India's youth, our young talent, is also for the global good, in the form of One Family.

In the times to come, having a large skilled young talent pool is crucial to sustain global growth.

Therefore, we should move towards "Global Skill Mapping."

This is also a priority for the Global South.

Friends,

While talking about One Family, we must also keep in mind the challenges that lie ahead for our Global Family.

We have seen that when a huge global challenge came in the form of Covid, the global supply chains built over decades were completely exposed.

Under the concept of One Family, today we must build a global supply chain that promotes trust and transparency.

This is our collective responsibility.

We cannot view countries and humanity solely as markets.

We need a sensitive and long-term approach.

We must pay special attention to the capacity building of the developing countries.

Therefore, India's proposal for a mapping framework will help strengthen the existing supply chain.

To make the global supply chain inclusive, we must also acknowledge the active role of small businesses.

It is essential that they have access to markets and information, and that trade costs are reduced for them.

Friends,

Continuing with the One Family mantra, we must also address the debt crisis faced by developing countries with sensitivity.

We need to establish a system that allows countries in crisis to overcome it and ensures that such crises never happen again.

I'm pleased that there is an agreement under the "Action Plan to Accelerate Sustainable Development Goals" to increase financing for this purpose.

I express my gratitude to all of you for this.

The One Family approach is equally essential for a "Holistic health and Wellness" system.

The WHO Global Centre for Traditional Medicine being established in India will strengthen the promotion of wellness worldwide.

I hope that we will soon make efforts to establish a global repository for traditional medicine.

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5% of their earnings into sports infrastructure for women in countries of the Global South.

This could serve as a new model of public-private partnership at the global level.

Second, similar to how all countries issue different categories of visas, we can **establish a "G20 Talent Visa" as a special category.**

This type of visa could be highly beneficial for our top science and technology talent to explore global opportunities. Their talent and efforts can contribute significantly to our economies.

Third, we can consider the **establishment of Global Bio-banks under the supervision of the WHO**.

These bio-banks could focus specifically on diseases like heart diseases, sickle cell anemia, endocrine disorders and breast cancer.

Setting up such Global Bio-banks in India would bring us great satisfaction.

With approximately 220 meetings spanning 60 cities, nearly 30,000 delegates in G20 meetings, over 100,000 participants in their side events as well as involvement of citizens from all corners of the nation, G20 engaged with the people in myriad ways.

Various line ministries diligently spurred active participation. The education ministry orchestrated Jan Bhagidari events, witnessing enthusiastic involvement from diverse stakeholders including students, teachers and parents.

Organised at levels ranging from state and district to block, panchayat and school, these events cultivated awareness about G20, the National Education Policy, and Foundational Learning and Numeracy – priorities central to India's presidency.

These events collectively drew over 23.3 crore participants, encompassing 15.7 crore students, 25.5 lakh teachers and 51.1 lakh community members.



Yet, the essence of Jan Bhagidari extends beyond participation numbers. An array of engaging activities – ranging from the enlightening G20 University Connect lecture series to interactive Model G20 meetings, Special G20 sessions in educational institutions, G20 Pavilions at prominent festivals, quiz contests, selfie competitions and the captivating #G20India stories – played a pivotal role in nurturing widespread and enthusiastic engagement.

Moreover, India's G20 presidency has highlighted the nation's distinct model of cooperative federalism. The states and UTs have competed with each other to welcome G20 delegates, generate local and regional enthusiasm, and showcase their respective traditions and achievements.

Furthermore, the presidency has effectively unveiled India's captivating natural landscapes and architectural splendour, igniting a robust resurgence in post-Covid tourism.

More than 125,000 delegates in 1,563 meetings were able to infuse a remarkable energy into the presidency. Civil 20 touched 45 lakh people worldwide. Social media emerged as a pivotal tool in the G20 process, galvanising citizens and public engagement, resulting in over 14 trillion social media impressions.

Two world records were created in the course of public participation. One was the involvement of 1.25 lakh students from 800 schools in the G20 quiz in Varanasi.

At the same time, 450 Lambani artisans showcased their skills and craftsmanship by creating an amazing collection of around 1,800 unique patches.

India's presidency has witnessed broad-based debates and discussions around themes that are crucial for our collective prospects. Prominent among them were those that involve a buy-in by the society, a goal viable only when the messaging seeps through the global community. A good example is LiFE (Lifestyle for Environment), which encourages eco-friendly changes in our daily habits.

The Y20 Engagement Group organized discussions pan-India to consult the youth of the nation on ideas for a better tomorrow and draft an agenda for action. It was successful in providing a platform for youth to express their perspectives and ideas on G20 priorities.

Five themes were identified for Y20 2023 around which the deliberations took place across the year in various outreach events. The five themes are:

- 1. Future of Work: Industry 4.0, Innovation & 21st Century Skills
- 2. **Peace Building and Reconciliation:** Ushering in an Era of No War
- 3. Climate Change and Disaster Risk Reduction: Making Sustainability a Way of Life
- 4. Shared Future: Youth in Democracy and Governance
- 5. **Health Wellbeing & Sports:** Agenda for Youth

The Y20 journey commenced with a Curtain Raiser in New Delhi where the themes, logo, and website of the Summit were unveiled. Building Consensus

The Y20 Summit culminated in a significant achievement – the consensus on the Y20 Communiqué. This document was honed to articulate the collective vision of the youth through multiple rounds of discussion, negotiation, refinement, and feedback.

Draft Communiqué Developed in a Bottom-Up Approach

The Y20 engagement group launched multiple discussions, consultations, brainstorming sessions and other Jan Bhagidari (public involvement) events across the country. The inputs gleaned from these events, which spanned schools, colleges, and universities, enriched the draft communiqué with valuable insights and policy recommendations.

Extended Consultations with International Delegates

A collaborative environment was cultivated for international delegates to engage in open dialogue and constructive discussions. Online discussions and a pre-summit meeting in Leh-Ladakh further refined the communiqué, embracing diverse perspectives.

Pan-India Outreach for Stakeholder Consultations

Y20 India conducted a total of 1497 outreach events across the country before the final summit at Varanasi. A staggering 64,000 discussions were organized across the country, involving over 26 lakh youth. Notably, 2600 foreign delegates actively participated in these consultations while 14,000 young professionals engaged in brainstorming sessions across various sectors in collaboration with Confederation of Indian Industry, Young Indians (CII Yi) and Research and Information System for Developing Countries (RIS).

Building Confidence in Youth as Active Agents of Change

Y20 platforms played a pivotal role in providing global perspectives to youth, nurturing balanced opinions on policy matters, and encouraging constructive thinking about local issues.

Strengthening of Youth Networks

These consultations facilitated interactions across diverse backgrounds fostering existing networks and engendering new connections.

hen India assumed the Presidency of the G20 on December 1, 2022, the Honorable Prime Minister Narendra Modi famously announced that India's Presidency of the G20 will be "inclusive, ambitious, decisive, and action-oriented". Looking back, we can safely say that Startup 20, the only new engagement group launched during India's Presidency, has delivered on all four dimensions. Under India's leadership the group has gone from zero to one. It has produced a first ever Policy Communique for the G20 leaders comprising a compelling set of recommendations for weaving the national startup ecosystems into a global one. The cherry on the icing is, the Brazil Presidency has decided to carry the group forward next year.

Startup20 represents a vast canvas. The startup ecosystems across G20 nations add up to over 850,000 startups; 1600 unicorns; 20,000 incubators; and 41,000 investors such as Angel Investors, Venture Capitalists, and Private Equities. There are startups in all sectors of the economy. Every G20 nation today is supporting startups. The Startup20 Engagement Group set out to harness this energy through an inclusive, ambitious, decisive, and action-oriented agenda.


Startup20 developed the Policy Communiquè through an intensely participatory process. Over four physical meetings in Hyderabad, Gangtok, Goa, and Gurugram, more than 500 international delegates from 25 countries and 1000 stakeholders from India participated. More strikingly, the Draft Policy Communiquè that group produced was opened up for public consultation. This move spurred something unexpected: across India and other nations over 40 startup meetings sprang up to discuss the document, resulting in over 800 comments from 15 nations. They represented views of startups, investors, ecosystem builders, policymakers, and more. It would not be an exaggeration to say that it was this process where no one was excluded that made the final step of building consensus painless.

Startup20 built itself up through deeply democratic processes. The very scaffolding comprising five task forces — foundation, alliances, finance, inclusion, and sustainability — emerged through intensive brainstorming among over twenty five nations at the inception meeting in Hyderabad. Furthermore, the chairs and co-chairs of these task forces were elected by the groups. The result was, there was a deep sense of ownership to the task at hand.

In its inception year, the group has called upon G20 leaders to raise their joint annual investment in the global startup ecosystem to US\$ 1 trillion by 2030. To harmonize the global startup ecosystem, while retaining the autonomy of the national ecosystems and helping startups achieve full potential, the group has recommended (a) adopting a Global Startup Definition Framework and governance, and due diligence standards (b) creating channels to access global financing, market, and talent (c) emphasizing inclusive practices to support diverse and under-represented groups and (d) building capacity to identify and scale startups that address our common challenges such as achieving the Sustainable Development Goals.

To implement these measures, it has proposed building a networked institution of existing nodal agencies across G20 nations. To measure the success of these joint actions of G20 nations the group has suggested four measures: ability to scout promising startups internationally, fund them collaboratively, mentor them contextually, and scale them globally.

The clarity and magnitude of this commitment by G20 as well as invited nations speaks for itself. Reaching an annual investment of US\$ 1 trillion by 2030 amounts to an investment rate that is 2.5-3 times that of the average rate over the past years. The group has resolved that such a goal, while ambitious, is achievable with joint commitment.

ACTION-ORIENTED

The work of Startup20 has already produced several actionable outcomes. For the first time the world came together to produce a consensus-based Startup Definition Framework. The framework is based on the existing definitions of startups across the G20 countries, the academic literature, and expert consultations. Such a framework is intended to help stakeholders understand what makes an entity a "startup" in different parts of the world and how to "value" it. Demystifying this question is at the heart of addressing the fundamental challenge of bringing startup valuation in line with the real value.

Recognizing that the true potential of startups will not be realized until startup ecosystems establish a culture of accountability,

transparency, and ethical behavior at all levels through self-governance, the group has produced a Startup Governance Framework. This framework is a comprehensive guide for startup founders to take practical measures to embrace corporate-like governance at early, mid, and mature stages. The framework aspires to ensure that governance need not be an afterthought no matter what is the stage of startup.

Leveraging the existing commitment of G20 nations towards meeting the sustainable development goals (SDGs), the group published a Framework for Identifying and Guiding SDG-focused Startups. This framework tackles the important challenge of identifying and fostering startups that are truly SDG-focused and proposes ways to scale them to global impact.

Acknowledging the importance of including the under-represented groups and communities on one hand, and the challenge of catering to the great diversity of who it is that is considered under-represented on the other, the group has produced a cataloging of Inclusive Practices Across G20 Nations when it comes to building innovation ecosystems.

Finally, to ensure that the above actions are taken consistently and effectively, the group has proposed an Architecture for a Global Networked Institution. This framework envisages a three-tier networked institution comprising a Global Network of Centers (GNC) that will weave together the existing regional nodes (RNs) via regional network centers (RNC) that acts as their nodal access point or point of contact.

What Startup20 has achieved over the past six months lays the foundation for the next decade of work in building the global startup ecosystem. This is the power of fully embracing the philosophy undergirding India's G20 Presidency: One Earth, One Family, One Future. ■



The Labour and Employment Ministers' (LEM) meeting for the G20 Employment Working Group (EWG), which concluded in Indore on July 21, succeeded in furthering this agenda.

Under India's G20 Presidency, the Indore LEM meeting marked a significant milestone with the adoption of the Outcome Document and Chair Summary. The outcome documents reflect the collective resolve of the G20 countries to address the pressing labour challenges facing the world of work today.



The EWG's mandate is to address priority labour, employment and social issues to develop strong, sustainable, balanced, inclusive and job-rich growth. The group's work is crucial in shaping labour policies and practices across the G20 countries, impacting two-thirds of the global population.

Under the Indian Presidency, the EWG identified three priority areas:


- Addressing global skill gaps
- Gig and platform economy and social protection
- Sustainable financing of social protection

World over, these issues are emerging as challenges for national governments. Under the Indian Presidency, four EWG meetings in Jodhpur, Guwahati, Geneva, and Indore preceded the LEM meeting. These meetings were instrumental in shaping the discussions and outcomes of the LEM meeting.

The LEM adoption of the Outcome Documents has been a landmark achievement. In a historic move, the G20 LEM made progress in fostering consensus on broader political issues. For the first time in India's Presidency, the G20 members in the LEM meeting agreed on the crucial paragraph, which speaks about respect for multilateralism and international law and the purposes and principles of the UN Charter. PM Modi's message which stated that 'today's era must not be of war' was also agreed to by consensus by all G20 members in para 16 of the Outcome Document. This is a significant acceptance of India's appeal for peace and it steered the G20 process towards a robust consensus.

The outcome documents represent a roadmap to address challenges across the three EWG priority areas. Mega-trends, such as digitisation, demographic changes, and green transitions have aggravated global skill gaps, as echoed in the first G20 EWG priority area. The Outcome Document 'G20 Policy Priorities on Strategies to Address Skill Gaps Globally' includes commitments by the G20 nations on basic comparable indicators in respective national surveys for collection and analysis of skill gap data.

These datasets will be captured on the 'ILO & OECD's Skills for Jobs Database portal' whose services, as agreed, will be extended to all the G20 countries. Another outcome is an agreement to develop an international reference classification of occupations — a first globally. These outcomes will benefit the G20 population by facilitating cross-country comparability, benchmarking, optimal

skilling, re-skilling and up-skilling, and mutual recognition of skills and qualifications. PM Modi captured the importance of these outcomes well in his address at the G20 LEM Meeting, when he said, "Mobile workforce is going to be a reality in the future. Therefore, it is now a time to globalise the development and sharing of skills in the true sense."

The gig and platform economy has spurred a new form of work where the workers participate outside the formal employer-employee relationship. This exponentially increasing workforce largely remains outside the ambit of social protection. The issue of social protection for these workers has therefore been selected as the second G20 EWG priority area under the Indian Presidency.

The 'G20 Policy Priorities on Adequate and Sustainable Social Protection and Decent Work for Gig and Platform Workers' includes a pledge to provide adequate social protection for all workers, irrespective of classification.

The EWG's mandate is to address labour, employment and social issues to develop strong, sustainable, balanced, inclusive and job-rich growth.



The 'G20 Policy Priorities on Adequate and Sustainable Social Protection and Decent Work for Gig and Platform Workers' includes a pledge to provide adequate social protection for all workers, irrespective of classification. Other outcomes include shared responsibility of all parties for sustainable financing of social protection and social protection across borders for online platform workers through bilateral or multilateral agreements. These will help such workers tide over stresses across the life cycle. In India alone, 7.7 million gig and platform workers are set to benefit from this.

The most recent version of the World Social Protection Report 2020-22 by ILO revealed that only 46.9% of the world's population receives the benefits of at least one social protection programme. The third EWG priority area under the Indian Presidency acknowledges the financing gap in ensuring social security coverage for the respective G20 country populations. The outcome document, 'G20 Policy Options for Sustainable Financing of Social Protection', includes a menu of policy options, including contributory and non-contributory mechanisms to ensure sustainable financing of adequate social protection for all. G20 countries may adopt these as per their respective national circumstances. This will enable people globally to avail gainful employment with adequate social protection for all, leading to resilient and inclusive economic development.

> he Environment and Climate Sustainability Working Group (ECSWG) wrapped up its work with the Environment and Climate Ministers' meeting on July 28, signifying a successful conclusion to their gathering.

> On December 01, 2022, India assumed the G20 Presidency, aiming to build upon previous accomplishments and establish a path of ambition to lay the groundwork for the succeeding Presidency. Amidst a challenging global landscape, the ECSWG took up the vital role of driving G20 cooperation in addressing complex and multi-dimensional climate and environmental challenges. Aligned with India's G20 vision as laid out by Prime Minister Narendra Modi, ECSWG set forth on a mission to foster an integrated, comprehensive, and consensus-driven approach to combat climate change effectively.

At the outset, the ECSWG issued a comprehensive issue note outlining its primary objective: to strive for the restoration of degraded landscapes, the preservation of marine and terrestrial biodiversity, and the reduction of intensity of resource consumption and environmental

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footprint. To achieve sustainable climate, environment, and biodiversity goals, the ECSWG identified three key priorities. First, arresting land degradation, accelerating ecosystem restoration, and enriching biodiversity. Second, promoting a sustainable and climate-resilient blue economy; and third, encouraging resource efficiency and circular economy. How climate change affects each of these subjects was dealt with. The thematic priorities embedded the consideration of principles of sustainable lifestyles, which also echoed the ethos of Mission LiFE, launched by PM Modi globally

in 2022. By adopting an inclusive, ambitious and action-oriented approach, the ECSWG sought to convey a united message from the G20 nations to the world, underscoring the significance of these priorities.

The 1st G20 ECSWG meeting was held in Bengaluru from February 09-11, 2023, which saw active participation from delegates, demonstrating their support and dedication to collaboratively work towards the objectives of the three priority areas outlined by the Presidency. The 2nd G20 ECSWG meeting, which was held in Gandhinagar, involved extensive deliberations on various initiatives under the identified themes, along with a dedicated session focused on discussing the outline of the outcome document or the statement from the G20 Ministers to the world. The focus of this meeting was on Water Resource Management with a side event hosted, followed by thematic site visit to the Adalaj Vav, Sabarmati siphon, Sabarmati Riverfront and Narmada Main Canal, showcasing India's ancient water management practices and the nation's long-standing tradition of conserving water resources to the G20 delegates.



The 3rd G20 ECSWG meeting took place in Mumbai from May 21-23, 2023. It involved extensive discussions on the draft outcome document with deliberations tuned towards driving consensus amongst the G20 countries on various challenging topics. The theme of this meeting was based on the theme of Blue Economy. A Mega Beach clean-up was organised, raising awareness about community participation in safeguarding coasts and oceans. The event received overwhelming participation, and delegates pledged to protect beaches. Additionally, the Ocean 20 dialogue involved experts-led discussions on addressing ocean-related challenges.

In addition to the work conducted during in-person ECSWG meetings, our Presidency conducted over 45 virtual meetings, some lasting up to 7 hours or more, with G20 delegates, in order to gain maximum consensus before the final ECSWG meeting, given that the working group's mandate is vast and extensive. The aim was to deliberate meticulously, line-by-line, and find common ground among the 20 member nations on critical issues, while also considering perspectives provided by the invitee countries and international organisations.

The 4th G20 ECSWG meeting, along with the Environment and Climate Ministers' meeting, took place in Chennai from July 26 to 28. After seven months of dedicated efforts, intense negotiations, and round-the-clock deliberations at the 4th ECSWG meeting, India's Presidency achieved a significant milestone - the issue of Outcome Document and Chair Summary by the G20 Environment and Climate Ministers on July 28. This historic achievement saw unanimous agreement on 64 out of 68 paragraphs by all the G20 Environment and Climate Ministers. Moreover, they adopted the 'Chennai High-Level Principles on Sustainable and Resilient Blue/Ocean-based Economy', marking a remarkable step towards fostering a sustainable and resilient ocean-based economy.

This is a landmark outcome for a number of reasons. India's Presidency was successful in facilitating agreement among G20 countries on recognising the importance of limiting global temperature rise to 1.5 degrees, adaptation action and loss and damage, the upcoming global stocktake, economy wide emission reductions, and sustainable lifestyles to combat climate change. G20 ministers unanimously emphasised on the need for actions to address interconnected climate and environment challenges and reiterated G20's leadership role in tackling climate change and ambitious action across all pillars of the Paris Agreement. In the domain of Mitigation, conversations emerged around aligning 2030 NDCs (Nationally Determined Contributions) with the Paris Agreement, emphasizing Long-Term Low Emission Development Strategies (LT-LEDs), and engaging constructively in the Mitigation Work Programme. The G20 also stressed on the urgency to enhance cross-sectoral adaptation and building resilience to safeguard livelihoods and protect developmental achievements amid changing climate, especially in developing nations. Additionally, the significance of scaling finance for adaptation and the upcoming Global Goal for Adaptation was highlighted.

Despite significant progress, certain areas proved challenging for the G20 to reach a consensus. Key issues, such as achieving net zero energy systems, tripling renewable energy capacity, phasing down unabated fossil fuels, and ensuring access to low-cost financing for developing countries among others remained subjects of diverse viewpoints. While some G20 members stressed on the urgency to achieve a global peaking of emissions by no later than 2025 and reducing emissions by 60% by 2035 compared to 2019 levels, the importance of developed countries reaching net zero status by 2040 was emphasized.

Our Presidency also created a wealth of knowledge in this working group with the development of 10 presidency documents. The leaders thanked India's Presidency for its efforts in developing the compendiums of best practices in water management, mining affected areas, and forest fire impacted areas, conducting technical study on 'Accelerating the transition to a sustainable and resilient blue economy', and technical documents on important topics like Knowledge Exchange on Circular Economy in Steel Sector, Extended

Producer Responsibility, Circular Bioeconomy. To strengthen the G20 Global Land Initiative, the Presidency also came up with 'Gandhinagar Implementation Roadmap' and 'Gandhinagar Implementation Framework' for voluntary adoption by G20 members.

The launch of an industry-led Resource Efficiency and Circular Economy Industry Coalition (RECEIC) marked a significant milestone under India's G20 Presidency. On the sidelines of the 4th ECSWG meeting, the industry coalition was launched in the presence of G20 Environment Ministers from 8 countries. Thanking the Indian Presidency for its efforts in launching RECEIC, G20 Ministers also invited the G20 Resource Efficiency dialogue to engage with RECEIC and leverage synergies in future.

The ECSWG and Ministerial Meeting concluded on a positive note, with all G20 Ministers showing unity in their commitment to tackle urgent global climate and environmental challenges. The successful outcomes achieved at ECSWG have laid a strong foundation for the upcoming COP and the next G20. ■

To Converge, Consolidate and Create a Healthier Tomorrow

n today's world amidst myriad health challenges due to frequently emerging and re-emerging infectious outbreaks, the major hurdle faced for an impactful health transformation is that the world is divided in its efforts. The common thread that ties all these efforts and initiatives is its underlying anthem of strengthening Global Health Architecture. However, in line with Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi's message of India's G20 Presidency to be inclusive, ambitious, decisive, and action oriented, health systems working in silos and not communicating with one another was a critical area identified by India's G20 Presidency.

With the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, the siloed efforts tremendously increased and became more prominent thus unveiling the fragilities in Global Health Architecture. The spurring of the initiatives, funding, panels, reports, and committees including G20 High-Level Independent Panel Report (HLIP), the Independent Panel for Pandemic Preparedness and Response (IPPPR), 100 days mission, 10 proposals for a Safe World Report expedited during the pandemic only with the intention of saving human lives and containing the repercussions of the pandemic. However, in the absence of robust partnerships be it in disease surveillance, R&D and manufacturing of medical countermeasures, different parts of the world kept reinventing the wheel oblivious to the duplication of efforts made towards the same cause in another part of the world or globally. The pandemic didn't discriminate geographical boundaries and affected the developed and the developing world alike. During the pandemic, India, under the dynamic leadership of Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi, again led from the front, in not just vaccinating

our own population, but making available life-saving drugs and vaccines to nations across the world under the initiative of Vaccine Maitri.


Realising that the world has worked so much towards finding solutions to the different problems posed by the pandemic, since March 2020, India's G20 Presidency, in line with the theme of Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam-the World is One Family, felt the need to take a step back, break silos, and integrate all the efforts made till the commencement of the Presidency in December 2022.

Besides, the felt need, resonating with the epiphany of the Universal Brotherhood and ancient philosophy of India, India's G20 Presidency theme of One Earth, One Family, One Future inspired the Health Working Group to arrive at the subtheme of 'To Converge, Consolidate and Create a Healthier Tomorrow' akin to 3Cs of India's G20 Health Working Group. This became the underlying motto and anthem of the Health Working Group Meeting penetrating into all the three identified priorities surrounding Health Emergencies Pandemic Prevention, Preparedness, and Response (HEPPR), Medical Countermeasures, and Digital Innovations & Solutions.

with Japan's G7 Presidency to promote convergence and the spirit of oneness in Global Health Architecture. Similarly, the same approach was followed when it came to discussions on Priority 2 for Global Medical Countermeasures Coordinating Mechanisms discussions in Johannesburg, INB, and WG-IHR Processes. India's Health Working Group had multiple series of discussions with relevant stakeholders to promote convergences in every facet of the identified priorities and advocated to create necessary linkages between existing mechanisms in order to break silos and unify efforts.

The subtheme of 3Cs came alive in Priority of Health Emergencies PPR when India collectively worked with WHO to initiate the discussions on the need for mapping relevant stakeholders working in the 5Cs of HEPPR i.e. (1) collaborative 2nd Health Working Group Meeting, Goa surveillance; (2) community protection; (3) safe and scalable care; (4) access to medical countermeasures; and (5) emergency coordination. Being aware that the biggest challenge these days is to get like-minded people to come together and discuss on how they can collectively bolster the impact of their goals by merging their efforts together, a mapping exercise to collapse commonalities and integrate divergences is the need of the hour.

The subtheme of 3Cs again held true in Priority 3 of Digital Health, when the need for converging the existing siloed efforts/initiatives in digital health was felt including moving from a product-based approach to an implementation-focused approach. In order to address this concern, India's G20 Presidency collectively with WHO launched the Global Initiative on Digital Health on 19th August 2023, which will act as the operational arm for WHO's Global Strategy on Digital Health 2020-2025.



They provide a roadmap for sustainable tourism, not just for India, but for the whole world. These priority areas have converged with India's goals in tourism over the last decade. Hence, under India's Presidency we were able to lead from the front in the five priority




isaster risk reduction is a core development issue of our times. In 2015, when the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction (SFDRR) was adopted by 187 nations, a conscious effort was made to ensure that the targets and indicators of the SFDRR are aligned with Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Since his days as Chief Minister of Gujarat, our Prime Minister has consistently articulated a vision that pursues disaster resilience as an integral part of development. His 10-point agenda, which he outlined after the adoption of the Sendai Framework, guides the country in the implementation of this framework.

Over the last decade, India and many countries across the world have made progress in reducing disaster losses, particularly mortality. For example, over the last two decades, India and Bangladesh have been able to reduce the loss of life from cyclones to less than 2%. This is a result of investments in forecasting and warning capabilities, warning dissemination systems, and community-level preparedness.

These successes notwithstanding, progress in disaster risk reduction has been uneven across the world. As highlighted by the recently concluded mid-term review of the Sendai Framework (2015-2030), progress against six of the seven targets – barring Target E on plans and strategies – is far from satisfactory. This has important implications for the achievement of at least half of the SDGs. Disaster risk reduction needs to be an integral part of the development strategy of a country if its ambitions for economic growth, prosperity, and sustainable human development are to be realised.

Recognizing the need for pursuing disaster risk reduction with a sense of urgency – not only for the benefit of G20 members but for the

entire world – a new G20 Working Group on Disaster Risk Reduction was established under the Sherpa track during the Indian presidency.

The Working Group met for the first time in Gandhinagar and agreed on five priorities: working towards global coverage of early warning systems for all hydro-meteorological disasters; investing in disaster and climate-resilient infrastructure; improving national financing frameworks for disaster risk reduction; improving systems and capabilities for post-disaster response and recovery including "build back better"; and application of ecosystem-based approaches to counter the risk of disasters.

While we are in the process of preparing for the third and final meeting of the Disaster Risk Reduction Working Group, I propose five issues that may be considered during future discussions:

First, we need to enlarge the discussion on financing. This includes exploring innovative financing tools such as reserve funds, dedicated lines of credit, and global resource mobilisation to supplement government budgets that may be constrained due to fiscal positions. Insurance and risk pooling solutions must be an integral part of this discussion. Countries that have a growing focus on capital expenditure require additional resources, capacities, and technologies to ensure that all new infrastructure assets are disaster and climate-resilient.

Second, with recent technological developments, we must recognise that there is an opportunity to sharply and quickly reduce losses from high-frequency, moderate, or low-impact disaster events such as heatwaves, lightning, local floods, and landslides. It is necessary to devise targeted approaches to reduce losses from such events, as they can yield results over the short to medium term.

Third, we need to promote convergence between disaster risk reduction and climate change adaptation. Strengthening analytical and implementation capacities for disaster risk reduction can also support climate change adaptation efforts. For instance, integrating flood management structures into disaster risk reduction strategies aligns with adaptation initiatives. Evaluating adaptation measures based on their potential for disaster risk reduction is essential.

My fourth point reinforces one of the priorities identified by the Disaster Risk Reduction Working Group. Technologies that support early warning should be considered a global public good available to all populations, regardless of their economic strength. Implementing

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the UN Secretary General's initiative for early warning for all should serve as a guiding principle, and the G20 can lead by establishing an appropriate mechanism to achieve universal early warning.

Finally, adopting a multi-tiered and multi-sectoral approach to disaster risk reduction. Integrating efforts vertically from local to global levels and horizontally across sectors will significantly enhance our preparedness to manage unforeseen risks effectively.

At the Mumbai meeting, the G20 members also deliberated on a three-year roadmap for the Disaster Risk Reduction Working Group. This will ensure sustained engagement by the G20 on Disaster Risk Reduction Issues. ■

rom the very beginning, Prime Minister Narendra Modi's vision of inclusivity has been the guiding light of India's G20 Presidency. The statistics are telling: women continue to be significantly underrepresented in the workforce, with a 24.9 percentage point gap in labour force participation compared to men. Further, almost half of women worldwide lack access to the formal financial system, with a persistent 7% gender gap. In terms of education – universally agreed to as an enabler of empowerment - only 49% of G20 member countries have achieved gender parity in primary education, with even lower figures of 42% in lower secondary education and a mere 24% in upper secondary education. This reality propelled the urgency of our mission and reinforced our commitment to addressing gender disparities comprehensively.

Over a year of research, multi-stakeholder collaboration, and tough negotiations, India ensured that this issue was front and centre in the G20 New Delhi Leaders' Declaration (NDLD), which received unanimous consensus at the G20 India Leaders' Summit.

The declaration leaves no room for doubt – G20 nations are fully committed to closing gender gaps and ensuring women's meaningful participation in decision-making. This commitment stems from the Prime Minister's early call for "women-led development" during the Bali Summit in 2022, and continues to reflect in India's domestic policies. The recent passage of the Women's Reservation Bill in the Lok Sabha, for example, is a momentous stride towards gender parity, granting 33% of seats to women in both the lower house and state legislative assemblies. This historic development reflects the government's commitment to elevating women's voices in policy-making and empowering them across all spheres of society.

This approach carried forward, reflecting in the G20 New Delhi Leaders' Declaration of 2023 which incorporated the Chair's Statement adopted during the G20 Ministerial Conference for Women Empowerment in Gandhinagar. The ground-breaking communique is testament to the power of collaboration and inclusivity, reaffirming the G20's dedication to policies rooted in real-world insights and the voices of those they impact most.

The NDLD recognises the urgency of tackling the root causes of gender inequality across sectors, demographics, and geographies. It commits to closing gender gaps in labour force participation, access to quality education (especially in STEM fields), pay, and ensuring equal access to decent jobs.

Taking a holistic view of gender equality, the NDLD addresses the following cross-cutting priorities:

- Labour Force and Decent Jobs: Reaffirming their commitment to the Brisbane Goal (2014), member countries aim to reduce the gender gap in labour force participation by 2025, calling for "more, better, and equally paid jobs for women."
- Care Economy: Emphasizes the redistribution of care responsibilities to support women's participation in education and employment and advocates for accessible and affordable care infrastructure.
- Digital Inclusion: Commits to halving the digital gender gap by 2030, focusing on accessibility, digital literacy, and safety for women and girls.
